IV、閱讀測驗

How the patient and the physician communicate can influence the effectiveness of the diagnosis and medical treatment. Many patients are reluctant to tell their physicians their symptoms. The prestige and power of the physician intimidates many patients. On the other side, physicians have difficulties getting their patients to provide the proper information. The technical nature of their questions does not mesh with the personal nature of the individual' s concerns. The reluctance can prevent the health-care giver from understanding the full nature of the problem, and often the patient see the physician as all-knowing. Patients who do not understand their treatment cannot ask questions about it. Many patients do not know how long they should take their medication and many do not know the purpose of the drug. The use of professional jargon to communicate technical information does not help the patient understand the treatment. Sometimes medical practitioners use "baby talk" and talk down to the patient. The number of patients seen makes it difficult for many physicians to determine how much each patient can understand. Patients often

construct their own theories about their illnesses that have little to do with reality. The problem can be dealt with by training patients to ask more direct questions. Physicians who are taught simple rules of courtesy, like saying hello, addressing the patient by name, and saying goodbye, are better perceived by their patients.

One major consequence of the difficulties in communication between the physician and the patient is the lack of compliance with medical advice. Noncompliance can include failing to meet appointments, not following diets, discontinuing medication, and other behaviors. Compliance is linked to the degree of satisfaction a patient has with the physician. Satisfied patients tend to comply better than dissatisfied patients. Patients with a positive view of the physicians may also have a greater sense of control, and they perceive themselves as in a kind of partnership rather than merely following advice. Physicians may themselves be motivated to keep the patient uninformed. Apparently, physicians avoid telling patients when they are terminally ill. On the other hand, almost every survey shows that people want to be informed about the details of their illnesses. Patients prefer to be well-informed, and their degree of satisfaction is linked to how well the physician is able to convey the nature of the illness. An increase in satisfaction tends to have a positive effect on recuperation.
