(1) The family of the late Chinese singer Teresa Teng on May 10 strongly protested the media's handling of her dead body, including shooting film footage and taking still photographs of her remains with absolute lack of respect for the dead person's privacy.

The footage taken by the Thai television network was released at about 7 p.m. on the night of May 9 by Reuters.

The controversial footage, which the television networks including the Chinese Television System, the China Television Company and CTN carried in their newscasts two nights ago, showed the covered body being pulled out in the hospital morgue. Then the covering was lifted to show the face.

Teng's brother, Teng Chang-hsi, said during a press conference in Chiangmai that the Teng family would take legal action against the violation of the singer's privacy and disrespect for the dead. He said that the family was not consulted at all before the media was allowed to take pictures and film the remains.

 - (2) Watching a baby between six and nine months old will help you observe the basic concepts of geometry being learned. Once the baby has mastered the idea that space is three dimensional, it reaches out and begins grasping various kinds of objects. It is then, from perhaps nine to fifteen months, that the concepts of sets and numbers are formed. So far, so good. But now an ominous development takes place. The nerve fibers in the brain iusulate themselves in such a way that the baby begins to hear sounds very precisely. Soon it picks up language, and it is then brought into direct communication with adults. From this point on, it is usually downhill all the way for mathematics, because the child now becomes exposed to all the nonsense words and beliefs of the community into which it has been so unfortunate as to have been born. Nature, having done very well by the child to this point, having permitted it the luxury of thinking for itself for eighteen months, now abandons it to the arbitrary conventions and beliefs of society. But at least the child knows something of geometry and numbers, and it will always retain some memory or the early halcyon days, no matter what vicissitudes it may suffer later on. The main reservoir of mathematical talent in any society is thus possessed by children who are about two years old, children who have just learned to speak fluently.

Folk song, then, has come to be the inclusive word, covering many varieties of music. For instance, the chanty, a sailor's song of the sea, is a folk song. A spiritual is a religious folk song. The blues, a predominately melancholy type of jazz popular in New Orleans, may be a folk song. In fact, there are folk songs for every occupation —railroading, herding cattle, and so on. To be considered genuine traditional folk songs, they must have oral transmission, continuity, variation, selection.

"One on the Range" illustrates how a popular song may become a folk song. It was first picked up as a folk song in 1910 by John A. Lomax in San Angonio, Texas. Lomax heard the song from an old man who had been a camp cook many years before on the old Chisholm Trail. The song was apparently known all over the Midwest, though it did not come to

national attention until the early 1930's. Careful research by Kirke Mechem established that a Dr. Brewster Higley wrote the words in 1873 and a Mr. Daniel E, Kelley composed the music. By 1947 "Home on the Range" was so popular that it was adopted as the official state song of Kansas.
